Whereas the purpose of the *Petroleum Products Pricing Regulations* is to ensure just and reasonable prices for specified petroleum products taking into consideration the objectives of preserving the availability of such products in rural areas, stabilizing prices of such products and minimizing the variances in prices of such products across the Province;

And whereas the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (“Board”) considered the manner in which it would proceed to set petroleum prices in its decision, 2006 NSUARB 108, issued on October 16, 2006;

And whereas the Board revised the retail margin and transportation allowance effective January 6, 2012, in its decision, 2011 NSUARB 181, issued on November 23, 2011;

And whereas the Board revised the wholesale margin effective January 4, 2013, in its decision 2012 NSUARB 213, issued on December 12, 2012;

And whereas the average of the average of the daily high and low reported product prices (in Canadian cents) for the week ended April 24, 2013, are:

Grade 1 Regular gasoline	72.9¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil	75.4¢ per litre

Now therefore the Board prescribes the benchmark prices for petroleum products to be:

Gasoline:	
Grade 1	72.9¢ per litre
Grade 2	75.9¢ per litre
Grade 3	78.9¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil	75.4¢ per litre

And now therefore the Board has determined, based on historical data regarding price changes and to achieve revenue neutrality, it is appropriate to apply, and the Board so orders, forward averaging corrections of:

Gasoline:	minus 1.3¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil:	minus 0.7¢ per litre

And now therefore the Board prescribes the prices for petroleum products as set forth in Schedule “A” effective on and after 12:01 a.m., April 26, 2013.

Alcohol Ignition Interlock Program Regulations

Order in Council 2013-150 dated April 30, 2013
Amendment to regulations made by the Governor in Council
pursuant to subsection 67(13) of the *Motor Vehicle Act*

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal dated March 27, 2013, and pursuant to subsection 67(13) of Chapter 293 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Motor Vehicle Act*, is pleased to amend the *Alcohol Ignition Interlock Program Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 298/2008, made by [the] Governor in Council by Order in Council 2008-309 dated June 3, 2008, to require those found guilty of impaired driving with children in the vehicle to enter into the Alcohol Ignition Interlock Program, in the manner set forth in Schedule “A” attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after May 1, 2013.

Schedule “A”

**Amendment to the *Alcohol Ignition Interlock Program Regulations*
made by the Governor in Council pursuant to subsection 67(13)
of Chapter 293 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989,
the *Motor Vehicle Act***

1 Subsection 4(2) of the *Alcohol Ignition Interlock Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 298/2008, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2008-309 dated June 3, 2008, is amended by adding the following clause immediately after clause (c):

(ca) a person whose license has been revoked for a violation of section 253 or 255 of the *Criminal Code* and who is subject to an additional period of revocation under subsection 67(5C) of the Act;

- 2 Section 18 of the regulations is amended by adding the following subsections immediately after subsection (5):
- (5A) A person whose license has been revoked for a violation of section 253 or 255 of the *Criminal Code* and who is subject to an additional period of revocation under subsection 67(5C) of the Act must participate in the Program for a minimum continuous period of 12 months.
- (5B) Except as provided in subsection (5C), the minimum period of participation in the Program required by subsection (5A) must be served following the end of any other period of participation in the Program required by this Section.
- (5C) A person whose license has been revoked for a violation of section 253 of the *Criminal Code* and who is not required to participate in the Program except by subsection (5A) may serve the minimum period of participation required by subsection (5A) concurrently with the period required by clause (3)(a) for any voluntary participation in the Program.

Order in Council 2013-151 dated May 2, 2013
Regulations made by the Governor in Council
pursuant to Section 12 of the *Nova Scotia Museum Act*

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Communities, Culture and Heritage dated April 29, 2013, upon notice of a fee increase having been given in accordance with Section 4 of Chapter 8 of the Acts of 2007, the *Fees Act*, and pursuant to Section 12 of Chapter 315 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Nova Scotia Museum Act*, is pleased to make regulations respecting fees to be charged at Nova Scotia Museum sites, in the form set forth in Schedule “A” attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after May 2, 2013.

Schedule “A”

**Regulations Prescribing Museum Fees
made by the Governor in Council under Section 12 of
Chapter 315 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, [1989,]
the *Nova Scotia Museum Act***

Citation

- 1 These regulations may be cited as the *Nova Scotia Museum Fees Regulations*.

Definitions

- 2 In these regulations,

“adult” means a person who is at least 18 years old;

“directly managed museum” means any of the 11 Museum sites that are operated by the Government of Nova Scotia, as follows:

- (i) the Museum of Natural History,

- (ii) the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic,
- (iii) the Museum of Industry,
- (iv) the Haliburton House Museum,
- (v) the Lawrence House Museum,
- (vi) the Uniacke Estate Museum,
- (vii) the Shand House Museum,
- (viii) the Balmoral Grist Mill Museum,
- (ix) the Sutherland Steam Museum,
- (x) the Prescott House Museum,
- (xi) the Fisherman's Life Museum;

“family” means a group of persons consisting of 1 or 2 adults accompanied by any number of their children who are under 18 years old;

“group” means 6 or more persons who are visiting a museum together;

“locally managed museum” means any of the 16 Museum sites that are operated by local societies on behalf of the Government of Nova Scotia;

“senior” means a person who is 65 years old or older;

“student” means a person who holds a valid student photo identification card issued in their name;

“youth” means a person who is at least 6 years old but younger than 18 years old.

Application of regulations

3 Except in Section 5 with respect to the fee for an annual pass for admission to all directly managed museums and locally managed museums, these regulations apply only to directly managed museums.

Fees do not include applicable taxes

4 The fees prescribed in these regulations do not include any applicable taxes.

Fees for annual passes

5 (1) The fees for annual passes for admission to Museum sites are as set out in the following table for the Museum sites specified:

- (2) An annual pass is valid for 1 year from the date it is issued.

Admission fees for single visit

“child” means a person who is 5 years old or younger;

“ESL group” means a group of persons who are studying English as a second language;

“motor coach group” means a group of adults or youth who are visiting a Museum site as part of a pre-booked motor coach tour;

“self-guided group” means a group of persons who are touring a Museum site as part of a pre-booked group without the services of a Museum staff person;

“summer” means the period from May 1 to October 31 in any year, both dates included;

“winter” means the period from November 1 to April 30 in any year, both dates included.

And whereas the average of the average of the daily high and low reported product prices (in Canadian cents) for the week ended May 1, 2013, are:

Grade 1 Regular gasoline	72.4¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil	76.1¢ per litre

Now therefore the Board prescribes the benchmark prices for petroleum products to be:

Renewable Electricity Regulations

Order in Council 2013-155 dated May 7, 2013
Amendment to regulations made by the Governor in Council
pursuant to Section 5 of the *Electricity Act*

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Energy dated April 9, 2013, and pursuant to Section 5 of Chapter 25 of the Acts of 2004, the *Electricity Act*, is pleased to amend the *Renewable Electricity Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 155/2010, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2010-381 dated October 12, 2010, to provide for multiple developmental feed-in tariff (FIT) rates for developmental tidal arrays, in the manner set forth in Schedule "A" attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after May 7, 2013.

Schedule "A"**Amendment to the *Renewable Electricity Regulations*
made by the Governor in Council under Section 5
of Chapter 25 of the Acts of 2004,
the *Electricity Act***

Section 18 of the *Renewable Electricity Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 155/2010, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2010-381 dated October 12, 2010, is amended by adding the following subsection immediately after subsection (4):

- (5) The Board must set separate tariffs for developmental tidal arrays with a single device and developmental tidal arrays with multiple devices, and may set multiple tariffs for either type of developmental tidal array.
