A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS in and by Chapter 92 of the Acts of Nova Scotia, 1962, *An Act to Enable the Inhabitants of the Districts of Western Shore, Gold River and Martin's Point to Provide Themselves with a System of Fire Protection*, a body corporate was constituted and named "The Commissioners for Fire Protection for the District of Western Shore, Gold River, Martin's Point," which body corporate was to provide a good and sufficient system of fire protection for the inhabitants of the Western Shore, Gold River, Martin's Point Fire District;

WHEREAS in and by Chapter 93 of the Acts of Nova Scotia, 1982, *An Act to Change the Name of the Commissioners for Fire Protection for the District of Western Shore, Gold River, Martin's Point and to Amend Chapter 92 of the Acts of 1962, An Act to Enable the Inhabitants of the Districts of Western Shore, Gold River and Martin's Point to Provide Themselves with a System of Fire Protection*, the name of the body corporate was changed to "The Commissioners for Fire Protection for the District of Western Shore & District";

AND WHEREAS in and by Section 56 of Chapter 406 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Rural Fire District Act*, it is enacted as follows:

- 56 (1) Where, by or pursuant to any Act of the Legislature enacted on, before or after the twenty-first day of March, 1963, any commissioners are, or any commission, board, company, fire department or similar body, hereinafter referred to as a “commission”, is created for the purpose of supplying fire protection to any part of the Province other than a city or an incorporated town, the commissioners or the commission as created, may, if authorized by a meeting of the ratepayers of the area to which such first mentioned Act applies, declare by resolution that the provisions of this Act shall thereafter apply and upon such declaration being filed in the office of the Minister, the Governor in Council may by proclamation declare that the provisions of this Act shall apply to such commissioners or commission, in lieu of the provisions of the Act which theretofore applied to such commissioners, or commission.
- (2) The proclamation issued pursuant to subsection (1) may
- (a) be in the same form as the proclamation issued pursuant to Section 17 and provide that the name of the commissioners or commission shall be that prescribed by Section 18; or
 - (b) provide that the name by which such commissioners or commission is thereafter to be known, the number of members, their qualifications and the method of electing them, or any one or more of such matters, shall be those prescribed by the Act by which they or it was created and, in such event, those matters not so provided for shall be as prescribed for commissioners by this Act.

NOW KNOW YE THAT WE, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of Nova Scotia, do by this Our Proclamation:

- (a) declare that, on and after November 9, 2021, the provisions of the *Rural Fire District Act* shall apply to The Commissioners for Fire Protection for the District of Western Shore & District, in lieu of the provisions of Chapter 92 of the Acts of Nova Scotia, 1962, *An Act to Enable the Inhabitants of the Districts of Western Shore, Gold River and Martin’s Point to Provide Themselves with a System of Fire Protection*;
- (b) provide that the name of the body corporate shall continue to be “The Commissioners for Fire Protection for the District of Western Shore & District,” as prescribed by the Chapter 93 of the Acts of Nova Scotia, 1982, *An Act to Change the Name of the Commissioners for Fire Protection for the District of Western Shore, Gold River, Martin’s Point and to Amend Chapter 92 of the Acts of 1962, An Act to Enable the Inhabitants of the Districts of Western Shore, Gold River and Martin’s Point to Provide Themselves with a System of Fire Protection*.

Whereas the purpose of the *Petroleum Products Pricing Regulations* is to ensure just and reasonable prices for specified petroleum products taking into consideration the objectives of preserving the availability of such products in rural areas, stabilizing prices of such products and minimizing the variances in prices of such products across the Province;

And whereas the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (“Board”) considered the manner in which it would proceed to set petroleum product prices in its decision, 2006 NSUARB 108, issued on October 16, 2006;

And whereas the Board revised the wholesale margin effective January 4, 2013, in its decision, 2012 NSUARB 213, issued on December 12, 2012;

And whereas on December 30, 2020, the Board issued an interim order in Matter M09952 increasing the wholesale margin for self-service and full-service gasoline and diesel, on an interim basis, by 2.50 cents per litre (cpl) to a total of 9.15 cpl;

And whereas the Board revised the retail markup and the transportation allowance effective October 28, 2016, in its decision, 2016 NSUARB 168, issued on September 26, 2016, and on February 1, 2021, the Board issued an order in Matter M09727 approving an increase to the minimum self-service and full-service retail markup by 0.3 cpl and to the maximum self-service retail markup by 0.4 cpl, to a total for the minimum of 5.4 cpl, and for the maximum of 7.4 cpl;

And whereas in a decision dated April 15, 2021, in Matter 09727 (2021 NSUARB 50), the Board directed a process to consider a retail markup adjustment mechanism, applied monthly, to address ongoing Covid-19-related reduced sales volumes to ensure just and reasonable prices for petroleum products pending recovery from the pandemic, and on June 2, 2021, the Board issued an order approving the methodology for the monthly adjustment mechanism;

And whereas the average of the average of the daily high and low reported product prices (in Canadian cents) for the period ended November 10, 2021, are:

Grade 1 Regular gasoline	78.73¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil	81.12¢ per litre

Now therefore the Board prescribes the benchmark prices for petroleum products to be:

Gasoline:	
Grade 1	78.73¢ per litre
Grade 2	81.73¢ per litre
Grade 3	84.73¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil	81.12¢ per litre

And now therefore the Board has determined, based on historical data regarding price changes and to achieve revenue neutrality, it is appropriate to apply, and the Board so orders, forward averaging corrections of:

Gasoline:	0.00¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil:	plus 0.60¢ per litre

And now therefore the Board orders that a monthly adjustment to the retail markup is required to account for the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on current sales volumes, as follows:

Gasoline:	
minimum self service and full-service:	plus 0.40¢ per litre
maximum self-service:	plus 0.60¢ per litre
Ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil:	
minimum self service and full-service:	plus 0.10¢ per litre
maximum self-service:	plus 0.10¢ per litre

And whereas a winter blending adjustment of plus 4.03¢ per litre is required for ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil;

And now therefore the Board prescribes the prices for petroleum products as set forth in Schedule “A” effective on and after 12:01 a.m., November 12, 2021.
