Decision and Order

Under S. 16 of the *Petroleum Products Pricing Regulations*, the Board must prescribe a benchmark price for specified petroleum products every Friday.

The benchmark price prescribed by the Board is the average of the average of the daily high and low reported product prices (in Canadian cents) since the last benchmark price adjustment for the petroleum product.

The Board must also prescribe retail mark-ups and calculate wholesale margins considering any factors the Board finds relevant, including transportation adjustments. The Board last set wholesale margins in its decision, 2021 NSUARB 146; retail mark-ups in its decision, 2021 NSUARB 50; and transportation adjustments in its decision, 2016 NSUARB 168.

The Board also issued an Order on September 12, 2022 (2022 NSUARB 140), approving an adjustment mechanism to retail mark-ups for gasoline and diesel oil to account for the impact of credit card fees charged to retailers.

At each price setting, the Board may apply a forward-averaging correction, based on historical prices, to achieve revenue neutrality.

At appropriate times of the year, the Board may also require an additional margin for winter blending of ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil.

Based on the foregoing and other requirements in the *Petroleum Products Pricing Act* and regulations, the Board finds it appropriate to prescribe the benchmark prices and adjustments in Table "A," the credit card fee retail mark-up adjustments in Table "B," and the prices for petroleum products in Schedule "A" effective on and after 12:01 A.M. November 11, 2022:

Innovation Equity Tax Credit Regulations-amendment

Order in Council 2022-270 dated November 15, 2022 Amendment to regulations made by the Governor in Council pursuant to Section 37A of the *Income Tax Act*

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Finance and Treasury Board dated September 16, 2022, and pursuant to Section 37A of Chapter 217 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Income Tax Act*, is pleased to amend the *Innovation Equity Tax Credit Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 21/2020, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2020-[0]45 dated February 11, 2020, in the manner set forth in Schedule "A" attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after November 15, 2022.

Schedule "A"

Amendment to the *Innovation Equity Tax Credit Regulations* made by the Governor in Council under Section 37A of Chapter 217 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Income Tax Act*

Section 2 of the *Innovation Equity Tax Credit Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 21/2020, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2020-045 dated February 11, 2020, is amended by adding the following definition immediately after the definition of "associated corporation":

"Canadian-controlled private corporation" means a Canadian-controlled private corporation as defined in the *Income Tax Act* (Canada);

- 2 Section 6 of the regulations is amended by
 - (a) repealing clause (a) and substituting the following clause:
 - (a) it is registered to carry on business in the Province and is a Canadian-controlled private corporation;
 - (b) adding the following clause immediately after clause (b):
 - (ba) if the corporation was formed as the result of an amalgamation, its predecessor corporations were incorporated within the 10-year period before the date of its application for approval;
 - (c) repealing subclauses (k)(vii) and (viii);
 - (d) striking out the semicolon at the end of clause (o) and substituting a period; and
 - (e) repealing clause (p).
- 3 The regulations are further amended by adding the following Section immediately after Section 6:

Amalgamation

- **6A** (1) If an approved corporation amalgamates with 1 or more other corporations to form a new corporation that is a Canadian-controlled private corporation with a head office in the Province,
 - (a) the holding period for the shares in the new corporation is determined based on the date the eligible investment was made in the approved corporation; and
 - (b) these regulations continue to apply to the eligible investors and the new corporation for the remainder of the holding period.
 - (2) If 2 or more approved corporations amalgamate to form a new corporation, the aggregate amounts raised through all specified issues of the predecessor corporations and the new corporation must not exceed \$5 000 000.
- 4 (1) Clause 15(1)(b) of the regulations is amended by adding ", unless the corporation requires expertise or materials that cannot be sourced within the Province" immediately after "Province".
 - (2) Section 15 of the regulations is further amended by adding the following clause immediately after clause 15(2)(d):
 - (da) funding the establishment of offices or manufacturing outside the Province;
- 5 (1) Clause 16(1)(a) of the regulations is amended by striking out "though" and substituting "through".
 - (2) Section 16 of the regulations is further amended by adding the following clause immediately after clause 16(1)(b):
 - (ba) for each of the 4 years immediately after the date its certificate of registration expires, the approved corporation's principal business is one of the businesses listed in clause 6(k);

- 6 Subsection 17(2) of the regulations is amended by striking out "4(b)" and substituting "6(b)".
- 7 Clause 19(1)(b) of the regulations is amended by adding the following subclause immediately after subclause (i):
 - (ia) an amalgamation of the approved corporation with another corporation provided that the new corporation is a Canadian-controlled private corporation with its head office in the Province,
- 8 Subsection 23(2) of the regulations is amended by striking out "90 days" and substituting "6 months".

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage dated October 20, 2022, and pursuant to Section 6 of Chapter 9 of the Acts of 2019, the *Tourist Accommodations Registration Act*, is pleased to amend the *Tourist Accommodations Registration Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 16/2020, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2020-[0]23 dated January 30, 2020, to improve the regulation of short-term rentals, in the manner set forth in Schedule "A" attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after November 15, 2022.

Schedule "A"

Amendment to the Tourist Accommodations Registration Regulations made by the Governor in Council under Section 6 of Chapter 9 of the Acts of 2019, the Tourist Accommodations Registration Act

- Section 2 of the *Tourist Accommodations Registration Regulations*, N.S. Reg. 16/2020, made by the Governor in Council by Order in Council 2020-023 dated January 30, 2020, is amended by
 - (a) in the definition of "Department", striking out "Business" and substituting "Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage";

- (b) in the definition of "Minister", striking out "Business" and substituting "Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage"; and
- (c) adding the following definition immediately after the definition of "Minister":
 - "primary residence" means a dwelling unit owned or rented and occupied by an individual either alone or jointly with others in which the individual is ordinarily resident;
- 2 (1) Subsection 4(1) of the regulations is amended by repealing clause (f) and substituting the following clauses:
 - (f) confirmation that the accommodation the host seeks to register complies with applicable municipal land-use by-laws;
 - (g) whether the accommodation is the applicant's primary residence;
 - (h) any additional information required by the Minister to assist in registering the applicant.
 - (2) Subsection 4(2) of the regulations is amended by
 - (a) striking out the period at the end of clause (c) and substituting a semicolon; and
 - (b) adding the following clause immediately after clause (c):
 - (d) confirmation that all postings on the platform operator's website include a valid registration number for each host, except for a platform operator listing only hotel or motel accommodations.
- 3 Section 5 of the regulations is amended by adding the following subsections immediately after subsection (2):
 - (3) A host must confirm their registered accommodation complies with applicable municipal land-use by-laws.
 - (4) A host must ensure that a posting on a platform operator's website advertising their accommodation includes the host's registration number, except for a platform operator listing only hotel or motel accommodations.
 - (5) A platform operator must ensure that all postings on the platform operator's website include a valid registration number for each host, except for a platform operator listing only hotel or motel accommodations.
 - (6) A platform operator must share records required to be retained under Section 4 of the Act with the Department if requested.
- 4 Subsection 8(1) of the regulations is amended by
 - (a) adding ", and information concerning the registration status of a host," immediately after "Section 4";
 - (b) striking out the period at the end of clause (h) and substituting a semicolon; and
 - (c) adding the following clause immediately after clause (h):

(i) under an agreement with a platform operator for the purpose of monitoring compliance with the Act and its regulations.

The Governor in Council on the report and recommendation of the Minister of Natural Resources and Renewables dated October 7, 2022, and pursuant to subsections 52A(1) and 52A(3) of Chapter 380 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the *Public Utilities Act*, is pleased to make regulations respecting performance standards for Nova Scotia Power Incorporated, in the form set forth in Schedule "A" attached to and forming part of the report and recommendation, effective on and after November 15, 2022.

Schedule "A"

Regulations Respecting Performance Standards for Nova Scotia Power Incorporated made by the Governor in Council under Section 52A of Chapter 380 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the Public Utilities Act

Citation

1 These regulations may be cited as the *Nova Scotia Power Incorporated Performance Standards Regulations*.

Definitions

In these regulations, "transmission customer" means a connected customer that receives service of 69 kV or higher.

Power quality

- 3 (1) Nova Scotia Power Incorporated must do all of the following:
 - (a) deliver stable voltage to a transmission customer under standard operating conditions and during any transient disruptions;
 - (b) maintain voltage on the low side bus of the substation transformer serving a transmission customer within a range of 0.7 and 1.2 pu for the period of 0.02 to 1.0 s following a disruption.
 - (2) If a transmission customer provides evidence to Nova Scotia Power Incorporated and the Board that the transmission customer's operations have been impacted by receiving power quality less than the range specified in subsection (1), Nova Scotia Power Incorporated must undertake mitigation measures to provide the transmission customer with the power quality specified in clause (1)(b).
 - (3) Any expenses reasonably incurred by Nova Scotia Power Incorporated in ensuring compliance with subsection (1) will be allocated across all customer classes as a transmission network resource.

- (4) The penalty for failing to provide power quality specified in subsection (1) within 18 months of a transmission customer providing evidence of impacts is \$25 000 per month until the power quality specified in clause (1)(b) is provided.
- (5) The Board must appoint a third party to confirm that Nova Scotia Power Incorporated provides the power quality specified in subsection (1).

Customer reliability

4 The Board must establish performance standards for customer reliability that consider geographic analyses of outages and reliability, including using customer level data and impact of aggregate data related to the frequency and duration of outages.

The Board must also prescribe retail mark-ups and calculate wholesale margins considering any factors the Board finds relevant, including transportation adjustments. The Board last set wholesale margins in its decision, 2021 NSUARB 146; retail mark-ups in its decision, 2021 NSUARB 50; and transportation adjustments in its decision, 2016 NSUARB 168.

The Board also issued an Order on September 12, 2022 (2022 NSUARB 140), approving an adjustment mechanism to retail mark-ups for gasoline and diesel oil to account for the impact of credit card fees charged to retailers.

At each price setting, the Board may apply a forward-averaging correction, based on historical prices, to achieve revenue neutrality.

At appropriate times of the year, the Board may also require an additional margin for winter blending of ultra-low-sulfur diesel oil.

Based on the foregoing and other requirements in the *Petroleum Products Pricing Act* and regulations, the Board finds it appropriate to prescribe the benchmark prices and adjustments in Table "A," the credit card fee retail mark-up adjustments in Table "B," and the prices for petroleum products in Schedule "A" effective on and after 12:01 A.M.
