Registration Of Class II Undertaking and Preparation of Terms of Reference for Environmental Assessment Pursuant to the Nova Scotia Environment Act

This is to advise that on December 17, 1999, the Nova Scotia Department of Transportation and Public Works, Purdy's Wharf, Tower II, 4th Floor 1969 Upper Water Street, Halifax, registered the Beaver Bank Bypass Project for environmental assessment, in accordance with Part IV of the Environment Act.

The purpose of the proposed Class II undertaking is to construct an arterial roadway extending from Highway 101 to the Beaver Bank Road. The proposed roadway is a 10.4 km limited access four-lane divided arterial intended to alleviate current and projected congestion on the local highway network.
