### Message from the Deputy Head

On behalf of Nova Scotia Environment (NSE), I am pleased to present our French Language Services Plan for 2010-11. We recognize the importance of providing Nova Scotians access to departmental programs in their language of choice. Since proclamation of the French Language Services Act in the fall of 2004, and the subsequent French Language Services Regulations in December 2006, we have made significant progress in building our capacity to meet the needs of our Acadian and francophone community.

NSE will continue to build upon its capacity to deliver French Language in 2010-11. For example we will develop a policy on written communication to enhance the delivery of services in French. We will also enhance online access to French resources related to public consultations.

We look forward to continuing our partnership with Acadian and francophone community, the Office of Acadian Affairs and other government departments and agencies as we continue to improve our service delivery to Acadians and francophones across the province.

### Responses to French Requests

Nova Scotia Environment (NSE) has identified staff members who have the ability and willingness to provide services in the French language in response to verbal and written requests from the Acadian and francophone community. When a NSE staff member believes that a request is beyond his/her capacity to effectively provide a response in the French language, the staff member is directed to contact the French speaking staff members for assistance. In instances where the request may be more complicated, the staff member is directed to seek assistance from the department's French Language Services co-ordinator.

### French-language Services Inventory

In addition to documents translated in previous years, NSE has translated the following documents into the French language and posted the information on the department's website:

- 46 water quality fact sheets;
- Public consultation page on banning the cosmetic use of pesticides;
- Public consultation page on the Five Bridges Lake Candidate Wilderness Area;
